A FAST BOTP - The Plan Behind the Plan

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Maybe you've been contacted about a Back on Track Plan (BOTP), or maybe you will be in the future. If so, here are some things to keep in mind.

The FAST team's goal is to support students in getting to a place where school is no longer overwhelming. However, getting to that place takes hard work and accountability. Accountability can sometimes be frustrating but it builds responsibility in both the learning coach and student. It is important that students are able to maintain consistent progress in their school work in order to achieve success and avoid being overwhelmed.

A BOTP starts with a referral by the homeroom teacher who has identified a need for additional student support. The referral is assigned to a Family Academic Support Liaison (FASL) who communicates via kmail that they are ready to assist the family with their needs. The FASL will set up a meeting to discuss with the student and Learning Coach how they can partner together to improve the student's academic or family situation. Each BOTP is individualized and addresses the specific needs that are identified in conjunction with the family.

The BOTP is a tool used to encourage engagement and to empower and equip the student. The FASL provides encouragement and expectations so that in the future students are prepared to stay on track and progress successfully in their courses. BOTP's usually last for 2 weeks but may last longer depending on the individual goals identified during the family meeting.

In short, a referral for a BOTP is an opportunity to receive extra encouragement, support and coaching on how to be a successful student in the on-line school environment.

Learning Styles – Fundamental to Learning

Over the last few weeks at MVCA homeroom teachers have been asking students in grades K-12th to complete a personal Learning Styles Assessment. This assessment is free to our students and provides a resource for understanding, appreciating, and most importantly, valuing the diversity of learning, thinking and working. When the unique characteristics possessed by others are valued, a positive shift in attitude often occurs. If your student has not taken advantage of this opportunity, please have them contact their Homeroom teacher.

Our Parent Learning Institute (PLI) will be holding a VIRTUAL Workshop for Learning Coaches & parents on Learning Styles in November. During our first session we will review learning styles and the assessment taken by your students. Learning Coaches and parents will be shown resources where they can take a similar assessment on their own learning style. In our second session we will talk about how to interpret Learning Styles results as well as how to use this information to help your students be more successful in their schooling.



Millennia ago early societies relied on an oral history, stories told from generation to generation so that those who came after would be able to continue to develop an identity. Often, within these societies, a person would be responsible for learning the oral history of a village, clan or tribe.

Today our society has so many ways to record our history. Every time you use social media, send an email or text, you record history. Our society has come to rely so much on these forms of communication to record our stories, but the best stories are told—not read; heard not written.

There exists a method to record our oral history right now in the United States. National Public Radio (NPR) with Story Corps has been traveling around the nation for several years and inviting people to tell their stories. Often it is a memory or an interview between a child and a parent.

NPR and Story Corps have issued a request to all teenagers across the United States. They challenge each of you to help add to our records of oral histories.

Many of you celebrate Thanksgiving, a time to come together as families – to welcome

with joy family members you may not see often. Take time to record a conversation and add to the American story.

We have an opportunity as a nation to become a primary document. We can create a database of memories that span 70 plus years of American history. Your story should be something personal – it could be a memory of a baby sister or brother being born, a first communion or bat-mitzvah, a family trip to Disney World, a new job, a happy memory or just asking about your family. All of this will add to the rich tapestry of stories that makes the United States a mixing bowl - a wonderful, beautiful mix of cultures, ethnicities, religions and races.

NPR and Story Corps have created an app to make your conversations easy to record. My challenge to each of you is to spend 15 minutes over your Thanksgiving break recording something on the Story Corps app.
